



HIKING & TREKKING EXPERIENCES

WILD TRAILS. ENDLESS HORIZONS. PURE ADVENTURE.

The Cariboo Chilcotin Coast region offers hikers a wide variety of hiking trails and terrain, from gentle river valley trails to multi-day pack-horse-assisted and heli-hiking treks. The diverse, uncrowded landscape in the region includes grasslands and ranchlands, mountains, interesting rock formations known as hoodoos, lakes, glaciers, and forests.

Explore extraordinary wilderness and pristine isolated lakes surrounded by the alpine beauty of the Cariboo Mountains. Access the high alpine camp at the 5,000-foot level via helicopter, where chef-prepared meals and well-trained guides take care of every need. Accommodation in roomy tents on platforms ensures privacy and comfort. A short hike puts you on the peaks and in high mountain valleys in an hour or less.

Wells Barkerville Trails

Find yourself in an alpine meadow or overlooking the Cariboo Mountains in just a day hike. With an extensive trail network, you have a good chance of encountering very few people — even just outside of town. Some trails were constructed before BC was a province; history is infused in these trails. Evidence of the great Cariboo Gold Rush can be found throughout the area, yet the landscape remains much as it was when the first prospectors arrived.

Tweedsmuir Park Lodge

Discover extraordinary walking tours in the Bella Coola Valley — from alpine to ocean, old-growth forest to volcano, these eco-escapes are ideal for all ages and abilities. Join experienced local guides on a hike in the Bella Coola Valley, a great opportunity to look for wildlife — especially local Grizzly Bears. Guides know the favourite hang-out spots and will show you bear signs such as claw marks, day beds, scat, and tufts of fur stuck in the bark of rub trees.

Tyax Adventures (fun@tyxadventures.com)

Get off the beaten track and enjoy the spectacular scenery of the South Chilcotin lakes and mountains — some of the most abundant wildflowers in North America, with stunning views and a remote setting. Experienced guides show you this beautiful wilderness as you observe wildlife in their natural habitat, hike through wildflower-filled meadows, wander alpine ridges, and learn the history of the area. Choose half or full-day hikes or fully-supported guided backcountry adventures.

With pack horses carrying your gear, hike freely along narrow ridges with incredible views over endless mountaintops. Experienced Licensed Wilderness Guides take you deep into a 2,000 sq mile operation area to observe wildlife, enjoy open-air lunches in secluded alpine basins, and marvel at the rainbow coloration on the glaciated scree. Over 25 exclusive alpine camps with deluxe amenities including fresh alpine air, near bug-free zones, pristine glacial water, and azure blue skies.

One of the only places in the Coast Mountains offering hut-to-hut hiking. Nuk Tessli offers accommodation in log cabins banked on a pristine high alpine lake — a gateway to a variety of hiking trails for all levels. Five cabins in three different areas provide hiking opportunities. Or choose a guided hike with the legendary Wilderness Dweller Chris Czajkowski, pioneer of Nuk Tessli. Trips focus on local wild mountain flowers, bird watching, and include 4 days of guided hiking and canoeing.

Trails & Pinnacles Provincial Park

Quesnel's well-maintained trail network offers something for everyone — from a casual stroll downtown to a challenging mountain bike climb or a winter snowshoe adventure. Accessible options include the Claymine Low Mobility Trail, Cottonwood Accessible Trail, and Kosta's Cove Accessible Trail, ensuring the outdoors is open to all abilities. A local highlight not to be missed is Pinnacles Provincial Park, just 7 km west of the city, where a short 1 km hike leads to stunning views of Quesnel, Baker Creek, and the park's iconic "hoodoo" rock formations. Open year-round, leashed pets are welcome.
